CONDITION & FINISH

When you've found something you like, but think it might need a little restoration work, there are a few ways to go about it. First, examine what you love about the piece and make sure it remains intact. If it's the way the timber peeks through a peeling paint finish on a cupboard, simply give it a wipe down with a damp cloth. Any more and you'll strip back too much paint. When it comes to rusty metal, say, a chair, you might need to give it a buff with **sandpaper** or use a chemical stripper to remove enough rust so it doesn't damage other furnishings or your clothes. A protective sealer (head to your local hardware store) is a great idea for wood, ceramics and metal, too.

More traditional antique pieces often benefit from a fresh coat of paint, in black, white or a colour, to bring it up to date. You can even combine bits from different pieces of furniture, such as the legs from one table and the top from another.

TIME TO DECORATE

furniture and objects is seeing how they fit into your home. Some pieces might have obvious uses, but think outside the box and repurpose objects. Use chairs as bedside tables, baskets and bottles as pendant lampshades, wire containers, porcelain cups and tin boxes as storage. If you're handy, why not make your own furniture out of salvaged timber? Some reclaimed items are purely decorative - you can hang anything on your wall and call it art. If it appeals to your aesthetic, go for it!

The most fun part of bringing home reclaimed

Using only reclaimed objects to create a home can be tricky, but to make it easier, start with a **simple backdrop**. White wall paint is best friends with this decorating style. If you want to work reclaimed objects into a mixed scheme with new pieces, try to choose complementary shapes, or paint old pieces in colours to suit what you already have. Whatever look you choose, it's a surefire way to inject your interior with character and soul.

bring home a reclaimed piece of furniture or object there are three points to consider: patina, palette and period. Inspect the patina of the object. Does the rust on a metal piece make it charming or just grubby? Check for hazardous chips and cracks in glassware. Water marks in timber add to its

moody, weathered tones - but with variations depending on the material - for example, cool metal, warm wood, creamy porcelain and translucent glass. Use these indicators to decide if a piece will work in your interior or not. Finally, consider the **period** of an object. Often, "reclaimed" implies an industrial vibe, but it can, in fact, be from any period. Perhaps Art Deco will suit your home, or mid-century, or even antique styles. Let the shape and detailing of a piece guide you. →
